Important Elements

- Inuit are rights holders
- Self-determination over research
- Involvement in all aspects of research, from start to finish
- Research WITH Inuit, not about Inuit
- "OCAP" principles (First Nations):
 - Ownership of data/knowledge/information
 - Control of all aspects of research
 - Access to information and data
 - Possession: mechanism of ownership
